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This tour takes you deep into the heart of Glencoe, where you'll see famous bridges and maybe even the Harry Potter train on a full-day adventure from Inverness. Starting in Fort William & Glencoe Tour From Inverness, this fantastic day trip begins with a stop at Loch Ness for photos, followed by 30 minutes in Fort Augustus to explore its lochs and town. You'll also see the Bridge of Oich at Invergarry, then visit the Commando Monument near Spean Bridge. Next up is Glenfinnan Viaduct, made famous in Harry Potter films, as well as the Bonny Prince Charlie monument. More stops include the Neptune Staircase at Benavie and Inverlochly Castle. You'll also pass by Fort William before heading to Glencoe, taking in breathtaking scenery and stopping at a waterfall. After that, you'll head back through Fort William towards Ben Nevis and Aonachmor ski and mountain bike resort, with the option to take a cable car ride. On your way home, you'll see Foyers and stop at Dores Beach at Dores Inn.Visiting Glencoe, Scotland: Scenic Landscapes and Historic RuinsThe tour begins with a drive to Loch Awe, Scotland's longest freshwater loch, followed by Kilchurn Castle, a 15th-century ruin perched on its shores. After lunch, the scenic views of Loch Awe lead to this iconic ruin, which is one of Scotland's most photographed sites.Next, a stop at the Green Welly Shop in Tyndrum allows you to stretch your legs and explore Scottish goods and gifts before returning to Glasgow. The journey offers breathtaking landscapes and historic landmarks that showcase Scotland's natural beauty and rich history.The deep valley and towering mountains of Glen Coe were formed over millions of years by shifting glaciers and volcanic eruptions. Located within Lochaber Geopark in the Highlands, Glencoe village is situated between Loch Leven and the mouth of the famous glen, making it an ideal base for exploring the area.To reach the Glencoe area, you can catch a CityLink bus from various points in Glasgow or take a train from Glasgow Queen Street. Alternatively, you can hop aboard The Jacobite steam train from Mallaig during peak season.For outdoor enthusiasts, there are plenty of opportunities to explore on two wheels, with numerous cycle routes around the area catering to all skill levels and bike types. You can also hire bikes from local businesses or take advantage of a weekend bus service that runs between Kinlochleven and Fort William.Parking is widely available throughout the area, and you can check out the nearest charging station for electric vehicles using the live map facility on chargeplacescotland.org.and on completion, the new 3 person Rannoch chaire will make the beginner experience even better. Glencoe Mountain Resort also has a reputation as being a great venue for the more experienced snowsports enthusiast. The upper mountain, with its breathtaking scenery, offers a variety of runs, including the iconic 'flypaper'the UK's steepest black runmaking it a must-visit destination for those seeking steep terrain on home turf. The resort is set among 200 hectares of fabulous scenery in the 'Meall a' Bhuiridh Massif'a large basin with outstanding snow holding characteristics which means skiing in late April and May is often possible. There are 8 lifts, 20 runs, an avalanche transceiver training park, free sledging area (sledges provided), a rental department, snowsports school, a base area and mid mountain cafe. The base station White Corries Cafe is open year round, serving hot and cold food and drinks. The mid mountain Plateau Cafe is open during the winter and also serves hot and cold food and drinks. Accommodation in the microlodges (sleeping 4-6 people depending on size booked), camping and electric hookups are available year round, with camping free during winter months. Facilities available to paying accommodation bookings include showers, drying rooms and toilets. In summer visitors can enjoy sightseeing trips on the chairlift, sno tubing on the base area plastic slope, downhill and cross country mountain biking (hire available). Directions Glencoe is situated on the A82, 26 miles south of Fort William and 23 miles north of Crianlarich. From the North, head down to Fort William and keep following the road South - turn off where you see the flags at the end of the driveway. From the South, take the M74 to Glasgow and from here, follow signs for Dumbarton on the A82. Past Dumbarton, the A82 continues all the way to Glencoe. This very scenic route will take you along the shores of Loch Lomond as you head north to Crianlarich, Tyndrum and finally over Rannoch Moor, from there turn off where you see the flags at the end of the driveway. Alternatively, if you are travelling from the East, there are several routes off the A9 which take you to Crianlarich and North. These include the A84 from Perth, the A85 from Stirling and the A827 from Balinluig.
