Active Voice vs Passive Voice: The two main ways to talk about action are active and passive sentences. In active sentences, the subject (A) comes before the verb. In passive sentences, the object (B) becomes the subject. Examples: - Active: Somebody cleaned the classroom yesterday - Passive: The classroom was cleaned every day

When using passive voice: - It's more formal than active voice. - We use it in written language when we don't know who did something or when we don't want to say. Example sentences: - A bank was robbed yesterday. - Jurassic Park was filmed by Spielberg in 1993. Passive Voice + By: We can use 'by' to explain who or what is responsible for the action. We don't often know who or what is responsible for an action, especially when it's clear-cut or if we prefer not to reveal the culprit. A bank was robbed yesterday, but we still don't know who did it. The police arrested the robber last night, making their involvement obvious. I recently found out you insulted my brother, but I won't say who told me. Jurassic Park was produced by Spielberg in 1993; however, my focus remains on the film itself. Passive voice is frequently used in news articles and formal writing. Arsenal has suffered a 3-0 defeat, and they are now ranked fourth in the table. The British embassy in Israel was destroyed by an earthquake, and the Catalan election will take place next September. In passive constructions, we use "by" to indicate who or what is responsible for the action. For example, the painting was acquired by a wealthy American, while Penicillin was invented by Alexander Fleming.

Passive voice is commonly employed in writing to provide more formality and clarity, especially when the doer of the action remains unknown. The passive voice, which uses a form of the verb 'to be' along with a past participle, is often employed for formal or written language purposes and frequently utilized in news articles. Correcting Verb Tenses; Past Participle Formations When constructing sentences, selecting the appropriate verb tense can be crucial for conveying accurate meaning. This construction allows us to describe events without specifying who performed the action. Finally, we have the simple past passive voice in sentences such as "The missing child was found." Here, the subject is receiving the action of being found, rather than performing it. By understanding these different verb tense formations and their roles in conveying meaning, writers can effectively communicate ideas to their audience.
