If you and your child's other parent agree about child custody and parenting time of your children, you can have your agreement made a court order without having to go in front of a judge. Before making an agreement, read about how child custody and parenting time works. You'll want to know things like: What are the types of custody orders? What are the types of parenting time or visitation plans? What does the judge look at if you don't agree to a parenting plan? It may also help you to try to come up with an agreement about child support at the same time, but you don't have to. Your courts Family Law Facilitator can explain child support and may be able to help you write up an agreement for both child support and custody and parenting time. Agree who will have legal custody or if you will share it (called joint). Legal custody deals with who makes important decisions in your children's lives, like education, health care, and more. Agree who will have physical custody or if you will share it. Physical custody is who your children live with most of the time. If you share your children close to equal time, it can also be joint. Agree how you will share parenting time. Parenting time, also called visitation, is the plan for how you will each share time with your children, including school days, weekends, holidays, vacations, and special occasions.
