## Political philosophy syllabus

This course delves into the world of political philosophy by examining influential texts and thinkers from the Western tradition. It focuses on four key areas: the city-state experience as seen in Plato and Aristotle, the concept of a sovereign state through Machiavelli and Hobbes, constitutional government as discussed by Locke, and democracy explored by Rousseau and Tocqueville. The course takes a detailed look at how various political philosophies shape our institutions and way of life. Course Details: \* The course is an introduction to political philosophy. \* It covers major texts and thinkers from the Western tradition. \* Three broad themes are examined: the city-state experience, the sovereign state, constitutional government, and democracy. \* Different political philosophies and their expressions in various forms of institutions and our ways of life are explored throughout the course.
